






Berlin to Kabul, 1926. 20p pair—position 14 (type II) and position 15 (type Ia)—collects 40p inbound postage due. Marked "4 dafda." Posted Berlin, March 17, 1926.

Peshawar City, N.W.F.P. (Indian P.O.) to Kabul, Afghanistan, 1927. **20p** (**Type Ia**), **blurred impression**, affixed to collect **20p inbound postage due**. Cover marked "J"" (= 2 "dafda"). Kabul arrival, "1305 Hoot 12" (March 2, 1927).

#### 10p "Royal Star Reissue, 1922-25" • Mixed Issues Franking





Stuttgart, Germany to Kabul, 1924. "Mixed" issues—20p (Type I), 1921 and 10p (Type II), 1922-25—affixed in Kabul. Posted Stuttgart, August 4, 1924. Cover marked "ל" (3 "Dafda" for 30p inbound postage due). Max Hähnle correspondence (German engineer from Stuttgart, Germany).

#### 20p "Royal Star Reissue, 1922-25" • Multiple Franking \*



"Légation Turque à Kaboul" to Menton, France, 1927. Franked with strip of three of the 20p (positions 6 [T. Ia], 7 [T. II], and 8 [T. II] of the sheet). Registration rate is 60p: 10p registration + 50p quintuple-letter rate. Posted Kabul, "1306 Hamal 19" (April 9, 1927). ex "Dietrich"

## 20p "Royal Star Reissue, 1922-25" • Wilhelm Rieck Cover \*

Wilhelm Rieck was a German engineer and traveler to Afghanistan, Persia, and India. Among several projects for King Amanullah, he helped build the Darulaman Palace and tramway (see "Kabul Interurban Issue, 1923" in this exhibit).



Kabul to Berlin via Peshawar, 1927. Afghan 20p Type II and Indian postage affixed in Kabul. Cover taken by courier to Peshawar where all stamps were canceled (June 29, 1927) then forwarded to Germany. The Afghanistan 20p pays the internal double-letter rate only.

Amanullah's attempt to modernize Afghanistan led to an increase in this type of mail to and from Europe, Russia, and America.



#### Supplementary Values, 1924-1926

Two Issued Denominations, 5 Q'ran and 5 Rupee; One Unissued Denomination, 15 Rupee • Typographed On Thin to Medium Hard Local White or Toned Paper, Perforated 11<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> on Two, Three or Four Sides

All Afghan Parcel Post issues from 1909 to 1929 consistently bear the legend "parcel stamp." These stamps do not. Thus, they should be considered as regular definitive issues.

Two Types of Each Value: **Type I** — Opposing Lower Corner Scroll Ornaments Connected by Straight Center Bar • **Type II** — Opposing Lower Corner Scroll Ornaments Connected by Curved Center Bar

The 5 rupee issued in block sheets of 4, top pair, Type I; bottom pair, Type II. Initial issue sheets had four normal margins and stamps perforated all around; reissues have one or two imperforate or deckled sides. Because no complete 5 q'ran sheets are known and only two singles of this value exist, sheet positions of the types cannot be determined.

\*\*\* This position single — with the "straight bar" — shows that the composition of the 5 q'ran sheets is different from the 5 rupee sheets contradicting Patterson's statement that "The writer has never seen a sheet of this value but he presumes it also consisted of a block of 4 with a similar setting, perforated all around."






